

**Math 13: Written Homework # 1**

Solutions be justified in a rigorous way. If you are unsure how much work to show, you can ask me prior to turning in your assignment.

- (1) (Problem #4, Chapter 15.1)
- (a) Estimate the volume of the solid that lies below the surface  $z = 1 + x^2 + 3y$  and above the rectangle  $R = [1, 2] \times [0, 3]$ . Use a Riemann sum with  $m = n = 2$  and choose the sample points to be the lower left corners. (Even though you can answer this question exactly, that is not what we are looking for. – This problem is to give you an idea of how one can numerically approximate integrals.)
  - (b) Repeat the same problem as above, except use the midpoints of rectangles in the Riemann sum as the sample points.
- (2) (Problem #24, Chapter 15.2) Sketch the solid whose volume is given by the following iterated integral, and compute the value of the integral:

$$\int_0^1 \int_0^1 (2 - x^2 - y^2) dy dx.$$

- (3) (Problem #38, Chapter 15.3) Sketch the solid whose volume is given by the following iterated integral, and compute the value of the integral:

$$\int_0^1 \int_0^{1-x^2} (1-x) dy dx.$$

- (4) (Problem #54, Chapter 15.3) Evaluate the following integral by interchanging the order of integration:

$$\int_0^8 \int_{\sqrt[3]{y}}^2 e^{x^4} dx dy.$$

- (5) (Problem #28, Chapter 15.4)
- (a) A cylindrical drill with radius  $r_1$  is used to bore a hole through the center of a sphere with radius  $r_2$ . Find the volume of the ring-shaped solid that remains.
  - (b) Express the volume in part (a) in terms of the height  $h$  of the ring. Notice that the volume depends on  $h$ , not on  $r_1$  or  $r_2$ .
- (6) (Problem #38, Chapter 15.4) Let  $D$  be the disk with center at the origin and radius  $a$ . What is the average distance from points in  $D$  to the origin?
